



Jordan Smart to Perform Concert Series Feb 28th

INTERVIEW BY DORI SMITH

Jordan Smart is a folk singer based in Latonia, KY. Covering a broad range of subjects — from parental epiphanies and questionable lavatory visits, scathing political commentary and hitchhiking cross country, satirical talking blues to love, loss, grief and even pickles — Smart aims to have a song for every occasion. His recent release Confessions of a CEO follows several producing projects and EPs. Dori Smith: Many of your songs seem part of the folk tradition of protest, where does that impulse originate from in your life?

Jordan Smart: While growing up as a teenager in rural Ohio I discovered punk music, and the thing that stood out to me most about it was the artists who said things that felt like we were not supposed to, or allowed to say.

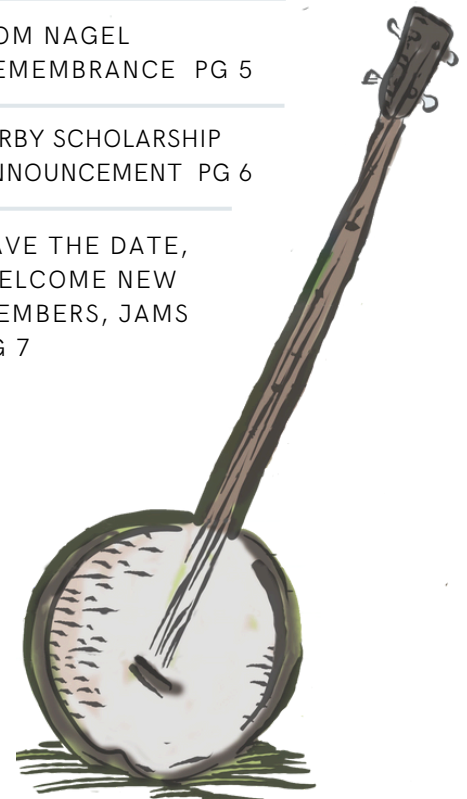

They didn't just say it, they shouted it. From there I traced the tradition back to folk songs, and that really opened my eyes to what one person can do with their convictions, a couple chords and a tune.

Smith: It's been said that your latest album, *Confessions of a CEO*, is reminiscent of the likes of Woody Guthrie and Nina Simone, can you talk about your influences in playing and writing?

Smart: As mentioned above my influences are pretty broad but if we're talking folk music I'd say some of my greatest influences are Phil Ochs, Malvina Reynolds, Pete Seeger, Elizabeth Cotton, Mississippi John Hurt, Dave Van Ronk, Woody Guthrie, and John Prine.

Smith: Your songs are so content-filled, what is your songwriting process?

Smart: Honestly it varies from song to song but mostly when inspiration strikes it feels like what I imagine taming a bucking bronco to feel like. I try my best to see the thing through to the end and not get bucked off in the process.

Smith: Your project Songs not Bombs, two full volumes of songs from contributing artists, raises money for the Palestinian Children's Relief Fund. How did that come together and what has that overall experience been like?

Smart: I started Songs Not Bombs because for months I was seeing compilations pop up in punk, noise, and indie music circles but in the folk/roots/country or "cameraman" world

I saw an almost complete and total void of action, or even acknowledgment of the ongoing genocide of Palestinians. I started out asking local friends who had a heart for the matter, and with a couple enthusiastic, immediate yesses I decided to extend invites to acquaintances I'd met over the years, and folks were eager to help connect me with others. It was a great learning experience, a lot of work, and it really showed me that sometimes people just need to be given direction. I gained a ton of respect for all of the activists and organizers out there who do that kind of work day in and day out.

Smith: Where did your musical journey start, and how did that develop into the artist and producer you are today?

Smart: As a young child I was always fascinated by the organ in my grandparent's basement and by 10 I received my first guitar as a Christmas gift from my mom. My older brother taught me some riffs and that was that... at 14 years old I performed solo and with friends in my first show at a coffee shop in Ashland, OH. Fast forward several years and I was paying my rent

by busking on the coast of California. It was never about money but once I realized people would literally throw money at me to keep doing this I figured I wasn't too bad and should probably keep at it.

Smith: Your artist bio on ReverbNation mentions all the genres you've played, punk, metal, indie, folk, bluegrass. What has attracted you to such a varied musical career? Is folk/bluegrass your landing zone or do other genres still call to you?

Smart: I really just love music in general, and have always been interested in exploring different styles as there are so many different ways to express things that we all think and feel. I moved to California on a whim at 18 and knew going into it I was seeking adventure, and an electric guitar and amplifier is simply impractical, so I opted for an acoustic guitar and naturally what I was doing was deemed Folk by others, so that is what I keep calling it.

Smith: Most of us think of hitchhiking across the country as from our parents or grandparents generation, how did you decide that was something you wanted to do and what did you most take away from that experience?

Smart: I always dreamed of grand adventure as a bored kid... but a lot of spectacular journeys seemed to require expendable income, which I never had. I watched the movie *Into the Wild* as a teen and realized that adventure is a choice, and the only thing in my way were my concerns for comfort and the life I had always known. Probably my biggest takeaways from the experience are that kindness is reciprocal, there is always someone out there who is willing to lend a hand if you need it, however you often need to let it be known, and lastly that every single person on the street, no matter how much they are struggling is a human being deserving of food, water, warmth, and a safe place to rest. If everyone had all of those things available to them without question, or stipulation I believe we could alleviate so much of the unnecessary suffering of the world.

Smith: Videos from GemsonVHS that feature you also include your daughter, how rewarding has it been for her to be present in your musical life?

Smart: When my daughter was born I knew I had a choice to make about what kind of life I was going to live, and by default give her. I could go the route of getting a 9-5 and climbing that ladder, but I felt at my core that what my kid deserved was a parent that not only remains dedicated his family, but also refuses to sacrifice his dreams, passion, beliefs, and vision of what his life can be. Despite all challenges, it does feel like I am succeeding in that way which feels extremely rewarding. Hopefully she gets it one day.

Tray Wellington Band Headlines 2026 Central Ohio Folk Festival

Headlining the June 6 & 7 Central Ohio Folk Festival held at Bank Run Metro Park is the acclaimed Tray Wellington Band, a celebrated and dynamic ensemble with a “genre defying” approach to making music. Bandleader Tray Wellington is recognized for his fearless exploration of the banjo’s possibilities. He is the winner of prestigious awards such as the **Steve Martin Banjo Prize** and **IBMA Momentum Instrumentalist of the Year**.

Tray’s work has earned recognition not only from peers but also from preeminent media outlets, including *The New York Times*, *Wall Street Journal*, *Billboard*, and NPR which have highlighted his innovative contributions to contemporary roots music. He has a reputation as one of the most exciting, forward-thinking, and influential banjo players of his generation.

Tray’s artistry has taken him to stages across the world, from intimate house concerts to landmark performances on Saturday Night Live with Mumford & Sons. He has been featured at premier festivals including the Newport Folk Festival, Telluride Bluegrass Festival, and Bourbon & Beyond, among others.

Originally from Wilkesboro, NC, he remembers starting to consciously listen to music when he was four or five. He started playing guitar in his teens and once he heard the banjo, he was hooked. Described as gregarious and an easy mixer when jamming with older musicians, he was exposed early on to folks in jam camps and festival circuits. He was noticed, won contests at events, and soon after began the launch of his career. He has a passion for the instrument and composition and songwriting.

The band transforms his work into immersive, high-energy performances blending banjo-led virtuosity with intricate rhythms, improvisation, and a modern sonic palette that pushes the boundaries of acoustic music. Their shows move fluidly from hard-driving originals to transcendent covers showcasing both instrumentation and vocals, inviting listeners into a dynamic musical conversation, celebrating curiosity, connection, and the power of music!

The headliner concert begins at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, June 6. The Kirby Main Stage is a large outdoor stage, however (like previous years), preferred, limited seating is closer and requires advance ticket

purchase. The cost is \$10 (festival admission) + \$10 (headliner). Otherwise seating space is further back and attendees must provide their own seating. The ticket link offers two seating options: under a canopy tent or under the open skies. In the event of inclement weather, the evening show will be moved inside a large tent. The Kirby Music Scholarship committee is now accepting 2026 application forms!

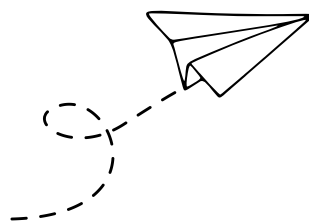
